# World Aids Day at Landmark High School: What you don't know can harm you

World AIDS Day, commemorated on December 1st every year since 1988, is a time when we recognize the millions of people impacted by HIV/AIDS, the lives lost and the families forever torn apart by the disease. Since 1995, the President of the United States has made an official proclamation World AIDS Day.

World AIDS Day is dedicated to educating people on HIV/AIDS prevention, challenging stereotypes and myths, raising awareness about the AIDS pandemic and mourning those who have died of the disease.

An estimated 2 million people a year die from AIDS-related illnesses, 270,000 are children. Worldwide more than 36 million people have died, and an estimated 63 million are living with the virus (HIV) that causes AIDS.

Here at Landmark HS, several students distributed red

ribbons - the global symbol for solidarity with HIV-positive people and those living with AIDS - to students and staff. Spark displayed World AIDS Day panels in the hallway so students could write messages of hope and solidarity to create Landmark's own World AIDS Day panel and were offered a Life Saver candy to symbolize the saving of their own lives. Ms. Alexis Thompson, Public Health Educator for NYC Department of Health & Mental Hygiene was on hand to provide HIV/AIDS and other STD awareness to Eric, Elvia, Brian and Theo's advisories and Sean's science classes.

# STEM: What's going on in Math + Science at Landmark?

### Global Warming: True or Not?

#### **Bronx River Forest Field Trip**

Students from 10th grade Biology went to the Bronx River Forrest before the Thanksgiving break as an ending project on their unit on ecology and the environment. Throughout the 10 week unit, and especially on the field trip, students had been studying how equilibrium is lost and restored in natural environments with emphasis on the unique urban ecology of New York City. The 10th grade students focused on making and recording observations as scientists while keeping a scope on keystone and invasive species. Students took what they learned from the trip and used the data in writing ecological reports through the perspective of an EPA agent. On the field trip at Bronx Forest, the three stations students participated in involved invasive species removal, water quality monitoring and an ecological restoration tour. –Reporting and photos by Living Environment teacher Shawn Rajan



## Taking Neuroscience Out of the Classroom and into a Real-World Lab!

This fall, the senior Neuroscience classes made two trips to Rockefeller University to work with neuroscientists in a real research lab.

#### DNA Lab: Isolating and Cloning Mitochondrial DNA using Polymerase Chain Reaction (PCR)

In the DNA experiment, we used a toothpick to gather skin cells from our cheek. We added something called primer and we used PCR to make millions of copies of a piece of our DNA.

Then, we used pipettes to put our DNA into a gel that separates DNA based on size and charge to see the results and if we had a lot of DNA.



Worm School: Screening potential candidate genes for a role in learning and memory using RNAi gene knockout in *C. elegans* glial cells.

In the worm experiment, we had to wash bacteria (worm food) off of *C. elegans* worms and keep washing them using fresh water. We then trained them to learn that benzaldehyde smell does not mean food. We put them on a plate with benzaldehyde on one side to see if they learned. Some of the worms were genetically modified and we were trying to find out if their genes affected learning and memory. One gene might have messed up the worms' memory because they kept going to the benzaldehyde smell. The scientists at Rockefeller will retest this gene and see if we made a huge discovery.
